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3. Features of gothic horror stories

When we speak of gothic we refer to the gothic 'mode'. 'Mode' is simply a fashion or style, and 'gothic' means a style of architecture common in Western Europe in the 12th-16th centuries. The architecture is defined by pointed arches and rich stone carvings. The gothic story or novel was therefore placed into this setting, as well as the ghosts and supernatural beings we are familiar with today in stories such as *Dracula* and *Frankenstein*.

The word gothic was not intentionally associated with 'bad' or 'scary', although it has come to be associated with these terms due to the mystery and fear the architecture evokes. Gothic literature can also include elements of romance (medieval tales of heroes, chivalry and love affairs) as well as melodrama (sensational dramatic genre of drama). For example the *Twilight* series revolves around the love affair between Bella and Edward (and to some extent Jacob) and battles amongst vampires and werewolves in modern America.
